**Gilbert White the Gardener**

Head Gardener at the Wakes, Selborne, Hants.

Capability Brown he is not.... garden too small.... but what an enthusiastic and knowledgeable guy is David. He works in Gilbert White's 30 acre garden, being part gardener and plantsman, natural historian and historian, archaeologist, detective and lecturer, etc.

Selborne, 25 miles S.E. Of Tadley, is quintessentially a microcosm of 18<sup>th</sup> Century Olde England, still with a rich variety of life that surrounds us and on which we should depend. It's unspoilt and breathtakingly beautiful with a colourwash of mellow old cottages and their cottage gardens containing a rich palette of old-fashioned flower varieties.

Gilbert White (1720-1793) was born in Selborne Rectory, over the street from The Wakes where he moved aged 10 years. He remained there till his death. Gilbert wasn't rich but comfortably off because of his richer London publisher brother. He lived a relaxed life as the bachelor Curate of Selborne, as well as being one of the first organised British naturalists and gardeners, and writing his world-famous book 'The Natural History of Selborne'.

David said Gilbert didn't actually 'DO' gardening. With gardeners' wages at 1/- (5p) a day in the mid-18<sup>th</sup> Century he had men in.

So far, David's years at The Wakes have resulted in many discoveries. He has traced and preserved 2 wood-pile ha-has. (Ha-ha, 18<sup>th</sup> Century French, wall or fence placed in a ditch, separating land in a large garden so as not to interrupt the views). The soil dug from the ha-has had made The Mound, topped with a wooden barrel from Oporto, formerly containing port wine but now made into a seat! David has kept Gilbert's Zig-Zag (literally) path to the Hanger clear and maintained. (Hangers = wooded steep-sides hills, a feature of Downland countryside).

Gilbert had a curious expression: 'borrowing dung' – he had the farmer bring the pungent stuff to his garden and used it as a barricade to 'heat' said dung to 40 deg. C to keep his melon, etc. plants warm. The matured dung was then collected again by the farmer.... We know these things because Gilbert kept fastidious gardening and weather notes (later brewing notes also) in his Kalender. He did this for 40 years. David studied this Kalender and we all wondered why bachelor Gilbert grew 600 cabbages annually!

The villagers thought of Gilbert as an eccentric – he also took over some of their gardens as well.....

The infamous 1987, 'what – storm? - no storm – BAD – storm' wreaked havoc with a swathe of Southern English countryside, and wrecked many of Gilbert's plants and trees.

When he was strapped for cash brother Ben stepped in but he sometimes could only afford a wooden urn, obelisk or Hercules statue, etc. Your 18<sup>th</sup> Century status was magnified with a wooden gate – he had a set of 6 made which were his 'happiness of a lifetime' ..... Funnily enough David said his Kalender/diary showed Gilbert spent hundreds of pounds on meat!

Gilbert had a fruit wall constructed and grew nectarines, peaches etc; 30 types of apple; medlars; quince; plums; 30 types of pear; and much else from skirrit (edible) gold-laced polyanthus, to sweet rocket, hollyhock, every species of scented and Damask roses and Ramblers, tulip trees taking 20 years to flower; Holm oaks, Cedars of Lebanon, 9 -12 foot (1 m to 4 m) Gibraltarian Reeds; foxgloves; rusty foxgloves, and much, much, much more.

He even had a tortoise called Timothy, later renamed Timothina..... There are no authentic pictures of Gilbert White but - there are many artistically-licensed ones, showing Selborne Church placed all over the place, but there's one picture David longs to see: a watercolour in the Houghton Library next to Harvard, U.S.A.

David really has worked a labour of love to root out the quirky splendour of one of our greatest naturalists and gardeners. Thank you so much, David, for your enthralling tales of Gilbert the Gardener.
