'Roller and Burberry'

Multi-talented Tadley resident Major George C Roller (1856-1941) was an artist, a soldier who served in both the Boer War and World War I, a steeplechase rider, a London Magistrate, and a Governor of London Hospitals and the Royal Berkshire Hospital. For much of his life George lived in Tadley at The Wilderness (now Tadley Court School) and The Cottage (now Rollers).

Our talk will explore the close links the Roller family had with local outfitter, Thomas Burberry, during the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

The Loddon Valley Lions Club

Worthy enthusiastic Club Secretary and Loddon Valley Lion, John Goodchild has been a Lion since 1987 – as a Vice District Governor, Chairman of the Governors and with all the other Lions, has been doing lots of grass roots good, not only in Tadley, but in the district and even abroad. If the Lions are involved, you know all will be all right!

The 1.4 million Lions are the largest international organisation helping those less fortunate, wherever in the World. They specialise in Medic Alert where the inside of one's front door has a sticker indicating that inside the fridge is one's personal information, ready for the Emergency Services.

Also there's information there about your pet(s) – and who's to care for them etc. This information also is linked up with doctors' surgeries and pharmacies.

Who pays for all this? The Loddon Valley Lions work very hard to raise money through Easter Egg raffles, the Tadley Treacle Fair (an outside jolly, very popular in Tadley!) Golf Days, the Christmas Float and local fetes and events, etc. There are over a thousand Lions' Clubs in Britain, with Ireland being separate. In our area there are Lions Clubs in Abingdon, Basingstoke, Newbury and of course, John's club here in the Loddon Valley.

The Lions' organisation began in the U.S.A. in 1912 when one Melvin Jones thought it a good idea to go international to help others. In 1917 they helped quell the Russian Revolution and from then on, the Lions spread all over the world.

The Lions help with donations, equipment, etc. gardening, decoration, providing wheelchairs, wheelchair ramps and support youth of the day also. One famous American lady, Helen Keller, who was both blind and deaf, urged the Lions to become Knights of the Blind, saying: 'alone one can do so little, together one can do so much......' White walking sticks indicated that a person was blind.

Taiwan had the first Lions' Club outside the U.S.A; then China, South America and by the late 1940s, help had spread worldwide.

Melvin Jones, William Woods and D.A. Skeen contributed to the United Nations Charter and respect for equal rights. Edukit produced the School in the Box, for children in disaster areas until their schools can be built/re-built.

The Lions promote an Annual Peace poster for the area schools with a prize for the winner: ages 9 years to 13 years.

In 1948 Sweden had Lions' Clubs and by 1950 came the first English one, followed by Switzerland, France and Norway. Our late Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother was impressed by the Lions' work and saw the deprived children in 1950 London's East End had a donation – and the Church of England Childrens' Society was formed.

Clubs were then formed in Brighton, Portsmouth, 1953 in Scotland, 1955 in Ireland and in 1976 the Loddon Valley Lions were created – because Basingstoke Lions' Club was too big and had a waiting list.

One should feel comforted that we have a Lions group in our area. They do so much good.

21 Nov - Captain John Aidan Liddell VC, by Natalie Larner.

Captain Lidell, whose family lived at Sherfield Manor, was a pilot in the Royal Flying Corps in World War 1. Whilst flying over Belgium on a reconnaissance mission he was seriously injured by enemy fire but landed the badly damaged plane saving the life of his observer/gunner. In recognition, he was awarded the Victoria Cross but later died of his injuries and was buried in the Holy Ghost Cemetery.
